What to Do If You Find a Snake

As the weather warms up, snakes become more active and sightings are more common around Leonora. If you come across a snake, stay calm and keep your distance. Snakes are always around, even if we don't often see them, and they are generally terrified of humans. Their first instinct is to escape, not attack. The best thing you can do is give them space and let them find their way back to safety.

Do not attempt to catch or kill the snake. It is illegal to harm or kill snakes, and doing so can result in fines of up to \$12,000. In fact, most snake bites occur when someone tries to capture or kill the snake.

Snakes play an important role in maintaining a healthy, balanced ecosystem. They're also **excellent natural pest control and love eating mice!**

The **Shire has a team of trained and skilled snake handlers** equipped with the proper safety kits to **safely remove and relocate snakes** back into the bush.

If you spot a snake on your property or in a public area, please call the Shire office, and one of our handlers will attend as soon as possible.

Ordinary Council Meeting

Public Update: Construction of the new power generation facility is anticipated to commence early in the new year. The solar field will be on the current airport site in the south west corner. A diesel generator and battery will also be built as backup. Gas cannot be used as the turbines take too long to wind up whereas diesel is almost instantaneous.

Inhabiting spinifex country north and east of Leonora, (where this photo of the nest was taken) down to mulga scrubland and mallee near Goongarrie and Morapoi, and even the banded ironstone ranges at Cashmere Range and Mt. Forrest. Its unique nesting habits—constructing large mounds of sand and vegetation to incubate eggs, carefully regulating temperature. As a threatened species, its dwindling numbers highlight the urgent need for conservation and the preservation of traditional land management practices, safeguarding a vital part of cultural heritage and the health of these diverse ecosystems.
