BACKGROUND

Leonora currently offers a range of experiences in areas such as heritage, environment, pastoral, mining, Aboriginal and the arts. However, for a number of reasons these assets have never transcended into the development of the town as a mono tourism destination.

Progress in major infrastructure projects that offer opportunity for invigorating local tourism (eg. Leonora mainstreet upgrade, restoration to buildings within the Gwalia Precinct and additional sporting activities and community services are prompts that lead to this project to evaluate the capacity for tourism to deliver increased economic and social benefits to the town and Shire. It is also expected that upgrades to the Outback Way and road access to the Great Northern Highway will bring increased tourist visitation to the town.

The need for a Leonora Tourism Strategy was identified through work and contact with various stakeholders in the region.

The strategy aims at determining a realistic vision for Leonora for the foreseeable future including key experiences to be offered.

Workshops were held in November, 2013 and February, 2014 with key stakeholders to assist in the development of the Tourism Strategy. The facilitation of the workshops and the completion of the Tourism Strategy was completed by Mrs Kim Hewson, Principal of Economic Transitions and Ms Elaine Labushagne, Economic and Heritage Services Manager, Shire of Leonora.

The Strategy text follows this report however Appendix 1 to 11 does not because of content size.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Tourism WA is a statutory authority under the portfolio of the Minister for Tourism and is governed by a Board of Commissioners responsible for promoting Western Australia as an attractive holiday, event, convention and incentive travel destination, nationally and overseas. Tourism WA enhances the tourism industry, infrastructure and product base.

Executive Summary

The Shire of Leonora ('Shire') is located approx. 830km north—east of Perth, the capital of Western Australia, and approx. 230kms north of Kalgoorlie, and encompasses an area of 31,893.2km².



Map of Location of Shire of Leonora, Western Australia

The Shire includes the towns of Leonora, Leinster, Agnew and the settlement of Gwalia (within the Leonora townsite). Abandoned townsites include Eulaminna, Kathleen, Kurrajong, Lawlers, Linden, Malcolm, Mertondale, Murrin Murrin, Sir Samuel, Vivien, Woodarra and Yundamindera also known as the 'Granites'.

The Shire can be accessed via the following Shires:

- North -Meekatharra and Wiluna,
- East Laverton,
- West Sandstone,
- South Menzies and Kalgoorlie-Boulder.

Australian Bureau of Statistics records for the Shire at the 30th of June 2011 state ¹:

- the estimated resident population was 2,513,
- the median age was 31.9 years,
- 80.9% of the resident population within the working population age (15 64),
- 45.2% of the resident population were born overseas,
- the total number of residents in the labour force was 1,344 in a total of 52 businesses,
- the primary occupations of employed persons were machinery operators and drivers (30.2% of employed resident population) and technicians and trades workers (23.7% of employed resident population),

- the primary industries employing residents were mining (49.5% of employed resident population), manufacturing (10% of employed resident population), and construction (7.2% of resident population),
- ²the value of minerals and petroleum to the Shire of Leonora in 2013 was \$1,594,666,656.

The Shire recognises the potential for a greater diversification of its tourism product, and the economic and social benefit that comes from more tourists to the Shire and travelling through the region. The main goals of the strategy include:

- To review the current tourism scenario including accommodation, transport, tourist activities, marketing and promotion,
- To review future tourism potential through project development and action plans which have the possibility of increasing business activity in the Shire,
- To analyse the risk associated with tourism in the Shire.

The Shire conducted workshops in November 2013 and February 2014 with key stakeholders to assist in the development of the Tourism Strategy. The facilitation of the workshops and the completion of the Tourism Strategy was completed by Mrs Kim Hewson, Principal of Economic Transitions and Mrs Elaine Labuschagne, Manager, Economic & Heritage Services, Shire of Leonora.

Overview of Tourism in the Shire

Key Stakeholders

Tourism in the Shire is supported by a number of stakeholders comprising government, government agencies and associations providing both direct and indirect support:

Direct Support:

- The Shire through its Visitor Information Centre located at the corner of Tower and Trump Street, in the Leonora town centre, the Gwalia Ghost Town and Museum, and the Leinster Community Resource Centre located at the Leinster Shopping Centre.
- O Goldfields Tourism Network Association Inc ('GTNA'), which is financially supported by the Shires of Leonora, Laverton, Menzies, Coolgardie and the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and includes the Golden Quest Discovery Trail. GTNA operates as a not-for-profit regional tourism association that promotes and markets tourist attractions, trail and the tourism industry in the Goldfields region. Its main objective is to increase visitation and duration of stay to the Goldfields region, which will increase economic and social benefits to the WA Goldfields community.
- Goldfields Esperance Tourism Alliance ('GETA'), the tourism development arm of the GEDC focusing enhancing the tourism industry and providing feedback and input to Tourism WA, and the WA Tourism Council and Tourism Australia.
- Australia's Golden Outback ('AGO'), which is one of five Western Australian regions
 is supported by Tourism WA through the Government of Western Australia for the
 promotion and marketing of the Golden Outback to intrastate, interstate and
 international visitors.

Indirect Support:

- Other Visitor Information Centres in surrounding Shires including Laverton, Menzies, Sandstone, Wiluna, Meekatharra and the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder. The Visitor Information Centres in each of these towns, and more broadly throughout the region, by provide a key marketing and promotional role in increasing the stay of visitors to the region.
- O Goldfields Esperance Development Commission ('GEDC'), which is a state government agency whose objectives are to maximise job creation and improve career opportunities in the Region; Develop and broaden the economic base of the Region; Identify infrastructure services to promote business development within the Region; Provide information and advice to promote business development within the Region; Seek to ensure that the general standard of government services and access to those services in the Region is comparable to that which applies in the metropolitan area; Generally take steps to encourage, promote, facilitate and monitor the economic development in the Region. The GEDC has assisted the Shire on previous projects including the development of the Leonora Loop Trails, and a Northern Goldfields brochure, both in 2008.
- Department of Parks and Wildlife through the State Government of Western Australia provide conservation and land management support to the Shire. The Shire provides brochures on nature and reserves throughout the Goldfields including the Shire of Leonora.
- Department of Mines and Petroleum through the State Government of Western Australia providing support and advice to prospectors and miners in the Shire.

- O **Tourism Australia** which is supported federally through the Tourism Australia Act (2004) and aims to influence people travelling to Australia to also travel throughout Australia; to influence Australians to travel throughout Australia, including for events; to help foster a sustainable tourism industry in Australia; and to help increase the economic benefits to Australia from tourism.

Transport

The expansive distance and high cost of travel between not only Perth and Leonora, but also nearby regional towns such as Kalgoorlie and Laverton, can be prohibitive for many travellers wishing to travel to the region. The most common modes of travel are air and car for intra- and inter-state visitors, and bus for those partaking a shorter travel distance such as from Laverton or Kalgoorlie.

Flights

Currently there is only one commercial air service available between Perth and Leonora, Skippers Aviation. Access to and from other destinations around Australia travel via Perth, Western Australia.

The airport is located along the western side of the town site, with the terminal 1.5km from the central business area.

Skippers Aviation commenced operation in 1990, operating a fleet of three Cessna Conquest turbo prop aircraft and one Cessna 402C from the Flight Centre facility at the Perth domestic airport.

During the past twenty three years, Skippers have focused primarily on its core business of providing outstanding service and flexibility to the resource industry within Australia as well as Regulated Passenger Transport destinations. Their key advantage is being equipped with modern aircraft especially suited to the rough airstrips and harsh conditions often found in remote locations.

Skippers continues to operate quality air services connecting remote Western Australian communities with Perth city, including services to Mt Magnet, Meekatharra, Leonora, Laverton, Wiluna, Shark Bay and Carnarvon communities.

In 2008, the addition of more De Havilland Dash 8-300, 50 passenger aircraft scaled their current fleet to 24 aircraft. In 2011, two De Havilland Dash-8 300Q, 52 passenger aircraft were added to the fleet which now comprises 26 aircraft. In 2013, the company acquired two F100 - 108 seat aircraft which now gives the company a total capacity of 983 seats. Skippers has the capabilities and resources to provide a quality service at levels of safety and comfort comparable with other major airlines.

Skippers is wholly privately Western Australian owned and operated.

The cost of travel one way between Perth and Leonora is currently \$415.00 (as at April 2014) however advertised specials for online bookings are available periodically and priced between \$227.00 and \$299.00. Child fares are available from Skippers on request and dependent on the passenger's age and travelling companion.

Bus

Currently there is only one bus service available between Kalgoorlie and Leonora (through to Laverton and return), GRT Express.

GRT Weekly Bus Schedule

The cost of adult travel one way between Kalgoorlie and Leonora is currently \$63.00 and child fare is \$36.00 (as at April 2014). Concession fares (same as child fare) is available for Pensioners, Healthcare Card Holders, and full-time students who are able to provide proof of identity.

Road

Many visitors to the Goldfields region visit Leonora travelling through the many access ways in or out of Western Australia:

- Via Kalgoorlie travelling north or south on the Goldfields Highway,
- Via Laverton travelling east or west on the Outback Way and the Laverton-Leonora Road,
- Via Wiluna and Leinster travelling north or south on the Goldfields Highway,
- Via Sandstone on the Leinster-Mt Magnet Road.

For those visitors travelling with caravans, a dump point is provided at the Information Bay located approx. 1km south of the town centre on Tower Street.

Many of the roads in the Shire of Leonora are unsealed. It is advised for all tourists travelling in and around the Shire to check road conditions at either the Visitor Information Centre or on the Shire website, www.leonora.wa.gov.au before travelling out of town.

Tourist Attractions

While many of the tourist attractions are currently marketed and promoted, the following provides a broad list of attractions which was highlighted during tourism workshops held in the Shire in February 2014:

Gwalia Ghost Town and Museum

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism, Mine Heritage

Tourism

Location: approx. 2.5km from Leonora town centre on

Tower Street.

Description: The Gwalia Ghost Town and Museum is a heritage listed site and offers a large collection of artefacts from the original Sons of Gwalia Mine as well as memorabilia from the Gwalia town site, including Patroni's Guest Home, Mazza's store, miners' cottages and camps, 'Midland' steam engine, the only surviving timber incline headframe in Australia, Western Australia's first passenger train, and one of only three 1912 Fraser and Chalmers winder engines in the world.

Tourism

Location: approx. 2.5km from Leonora town centre and

approx. 250m from the Gwalia Ghost Town.

Description: A Federation-era bungalow, it was commissioned in 1898 as the Mine Manager's Residence for the Sons of Gwalia Gold Mine. Its commissioner was an ambitious 23-year-old American named Herbert Clark Hoover (21st President of the USA) who was at the time in charge of the mine. Today it operates as a bed and breakfast, and function venue.



Lake Raeside

Tourism Category: Eco-tourism

Location: approx. 8kms south of Leonora town on the

Goldfields Highway.

Description: Lake Raeside, when full, covers an area of about 140,000 hectares and is located in WA. Six creeks and rivers flow into the Lake Raeside. The five longest tributaries are Boyce Creek, Nine Mile Creek, Yerilla Creek, Davis Creek and Crossland Creek - click here for a full list of all 6 tributaries of the Lake Raeside.



Malcolm Dam

Tourism Category: Eco-tourism

Location: approx. 12kms east of Leonora on the Laverton-

Leonora Road.

Description: Once a large rock pool Malcom Dam was excavated, in 1902, into a large dam, in order to increase the capacity of water. It is now a great picnic site and good for yabbying, as well is a very popular camping area.



Leonora Loop Trails

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: Commence in Leonora and combined travel

432.8kms

Description: The Leonora Loop Trails comprise the Agnew Loop (298.4kms) and Darlot Loop (345.8kms). Each trail

has approx. 15 interpretive sites and information.



The Breakaways/Terraces Tourism Category: Geo-tourism

Location: approx. 40kms north-east of Leonora town.

Description: The 'break-away' formations, created through the erosion of plateaux by wind and rain, are relatively common within outback Australia but 'The

Terraces' are a particularly fine example.



Churches

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: throughout the town of Leonora.

Description: The churches from the early 1900's still being used today for services including the Catholic Church – Sacred Heart, and the Leonora Christian Fellowship Church. Many of the church buildings have a colourful

history.



Golden Quest Discovery Trail

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: traverses the Shire with various sites.

Description: Spanning 965kms with 25 heritage sites from the Shire of Coolgardie (Site 1) through the Shires of Menzies, Laverton, Leonora and the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder (Site 25). The sites in the Shire of Leonora include Site 10 – Old Rail Bridges, Site 16 – Gwalia, Site 17 –

Leonora, Site 18 – Granite Creek.



Agnew

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: approx. 130kms north-west of Leonora on the

Goldfields Highway/Agnew-Sandstone Road.

Description: Located on the Leonora Loop Trails – Agnew Loop, this historic town was named after a miner and

declared a town in 1936.



Mt Leonora

Tourism Category: Geo-tourism, Eco-tourism **Location**: approx. 4kms south of Leonora town.

Description: Named after the first European explorer, John Forrest's niece on his arrival in the area in 1869, prior to gold being found nearby and the town of Leonora being

developed.



Battery

Tourism Category: Mine Heritage Tourism

Location: Battery Place

Description: The State Battery machinery was manufactured by Messrs Forward, Down and Co of Adelaide. It was shipped to Fremantle in October 1898 and forwarded to Leonora by rail and road. The erection of the Battery was undertaken by Mr J. Whitelaw and completed in January 1800.

in January 1899.



Wildflowers

Tourism Category: Eco-tourism

Location: throughout the Shire of Leonora – Goldfields Highway, Laverton-Leonora Road, and various off-roads. **Description**: During Spring (September – November), view the picturesque scenery of the wildflowers in bloom.



Horse Racing

Tourism Category: Event Tourism

Location: Racecourse Road, off Leonora-Mt Ida Road,

Leonora.

Description: Race meetings, two days, Saturday and Monday are held during the Golden Gift weekend which coincides with the Western Australia Day public holiday in June.



Golden Gift

Tourism Category: Event Tourism **Location**: run on Tower Street.

Description: First held in 2006, the Leonora Golden Gift is held over the June long weekend, and offers elite athletes up to \$50,000 in prize money. This event is held in

conjunction with the Menzies Cyclassic.



Prospecting

Tourism Category: Geo-tourism

Location: throughout the Shire of Leonora.

Description: While gold is still found through prospecting, it is recommended that prospectors contact the Department of Mines and Petroleum to obtain a miners' right and obtain all of the latest information on

prospecting in Western Australia.



Mertondale Townsite

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism, Mine Heritage

Tourism

Location: approx. 30kms north of Leonora on the

Leonora-Nambi Road.

Description: Now an abandoned town site, Mertondale was named after a miner who found a large deposit of gold in the area in 1898. The lease was named Merton's Find, or Merton's Reward, however gold and the town site disappeared around 1910.



Leonora Cemetery

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: on Memorial Drive approx. 2kms south of

Leonora town.

Description: The graves provide an historical account of

the deaths of residents in Leonora and Gwalia.



Cemeteries

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: various throughout the Shire of Leonora.

Description: Visit the many cemeteries to gain an understanding of the hardships of living in a harsh, remote community in the Northern Goldfields, where water was

scarce and sickness was at times rife.



Sports Clubs

Tourism Category: Cultural Tourism, Events Tourism **Location**: various throughout the Shire of Leonora.

Description: Leonora has a range of clubs visitors can partake in a game or simply enjoy some local company – Aquatic Centre, Golf Club, Gun Club, Recreation Centre,

Rifle Club, Bowls Club, and Race Club.



Leonora Main Streetscape

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism **Location**: Tower Street, town centre.

Description: The town centre provides a streetscape that

accentuates the history and heritage of the town.



War Memorial

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: Tower Street

Description: Leonora War Memorial commemorates Australian servicemen and women who have served in all wars and conflicts. Annual ANZAC services are held at the War Memorial where both locals and visitors are welcome

to commemorate together.



Station Masters House (now privately owned)

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism **Location**: 501 Kurrajong Street, Leonora

Description: The Station Master's House in Leonora was part of a railway complex constructed in the 1902 by the Public Works Department as a result of the extension of the narrow gauge Eastern Goldfields line from Menzies

during the gold boom period of the early 1900s.



Town Historical Buildings

Tourism Category: Mine Heritage Tourism Heritage

Tourism, Cultural Tourism

Location: Tower Street and surrounding streets

Description: Tower Street and surrounding streets provide an historical walk through yester-year. Many of the building façades remain, indicating the year they were

erected.



Barnes Federal Theatre

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: Tower Street

Description: Brothers David and Philip Barnes established the Leonora Hotel in 1896. The timber and hessian building was the first hotel in Leonora and was soon doing a roaring trade. It was often advertised as the 'Home of the Working Man'. Work on the hotel's large adjoining hall, known as Barnes' Federal Theatre, started in May 1899 and together with the reconstructed brick and stone Leonora Hotel, opened in April 1901. Constructed of local stone, Barnes' Federal Hall became the focus of regular community and social activities. Gwalia and Leonora residents regularly attended balls, banquets, picture shows, theatre and musical concerts in the hall. The Leonora Hotel was demolished in 1927. In the same year, the Leonora Road Board purchased Barnes Federal Theatre for use as a community hall. In 2006, Barnes Federal Theatre was entered in the Western Australia's State Register of Heritage Places.



Hotels

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism, Cultural Tourism

Location: Tower Street

Description: A number of historical hotels are still in operation including the Central Hotel and the White House Hotel. Both offer food and beverage facilities with both providing accommodation.

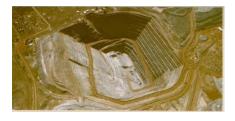


Gwalia Minesite

Tourism Category: Mine Heritage Tourism

Location: Tower Street, Gwalia

Description: Once one of the largest gold mines in Australia, the Sons of Gwalia Ltd operated from 1897 to 1963 with United States President Herbert Hoover employed as Manager from May to November 1898. The mine experienced many years of fluctuating profits, closing in 1963. Sons of Gwalia NL was incorporated in 1981, and the mine re-opened. After a second unsuccessful attempt at trading, the mine was eventually sold to St Barbara Ltd in March 2005. The mine is currently in operation.



Information Bay

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism

Location: Tower Street

Description: The J.L. Epis Information Bay provides information on businesses in Leonora, and an RV dump point. There is a reconstruction of how gold was won over 100 years ago. A prospector with his dray load of ore breaking the rocks s up with a sledge hammer before shovelling it into the stamp mill which was driven by steam. The ground ore then went over copper plates to extract gold.



Smoodgers Hill

Tourism Category: Eco-tourism

Location: Laverton-Leonora Road, turn off to the Lookout

at Malcolm

Description: Locally known as Tanky Hill, the lookout provides a bird's eye view of Leonora, as well as some

great geological formations in the hill.



State Hotel Gwalia

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism, Cultural Tourism

Location: Tower Street, Gwalia

Description: Built in 1903, the State Hotel provided a social venue for the residents of Gwalia, many being from the Italian and Yugoslav communities. Today the hotel is

owned by St Barbara Ltd but not being used.



Malcolm Townsite

Tourism Category: Heritage Tourism **Location**: approx. 19kms east of Leonora

Description: Gold was discovered in 1895 and by 1903 was a thriving town. Malcolm is now an abandoned

mining town.



Walkatjurra Rangers

Tourism Category: Indigenous Tourism, Cultural Tourism

Location: Leonora

Description: An authentic tour connecting people with Country and providing insight into the Indigenous Culture. Enjoy walks across country from Wiluna to Leonora, camp out bush, enjoy traditional bush tucker and learn about Indigenous Culture. This tour touches on various aspects of cultural experience and educates on traditional land management, bush medicine, cultural knowledge and awareness combined with a practical experience.



Marketing & Promotion

Legislation, Regulation & Policy

Tourism WA is a statutory authority under the portfolio of the Minister for Tourism and is governed by a Board of Commissioners. Responsible for promoting Western Australia as an attractive holiday, event, convention and incentive travel destination, nationally and overseas, Tourism WA enhances the tourism industry, infrastructure and product base.

Tourism WA focuses on three key operational areas which aim to increase visitor numbers and the tourism industry's contribution to the State economy:

- Marketing the State as a competitive tourism destination
- Developing, attracting and marketing major events
- Supporting significant tourism infrastructure and development projects.

The State Government Strategy for Tourism in Western Australia 2020 was released on December 2012 following comprehensive consultation with the tourism industry and government agencies. The overall vision statement for both Tourism WA and for the Western Australia tourism industry is as follows:

Through partnership between private sector and government, the State's tourism industry will achieve its full potential by delivering against the tourism brand promise – Experience Extraordinary Western Australia.

To bring this vision to life, over the decade between 2010 and 2020, a stretch goal for tourism in Western Australia has been developed. This is:

To double the value of tourism in Western Australia – from \$6 billion in 2010 to \$12 billion by 2020.

To achieve the stretch goal, seven strategic pillars have been identified. These pillars have been determined by linking the critical issues facing tourism and the current strategies of Tourism WA, other government agencies (Federal, State and Local) and the broader tourism industry.

Australia's Golden Outback was established in early 2004 following the development of the "New Concept for State Tourism" by the Western Australian Tourism Commission.

The Region comprises of four tourism precincts - Goldfields, Gascoyne/Murchison, Wheatbelt and Coastal sub-regions. It is the recognised marketing organisation under the umbrella of Tourism Western Australia (TWA) formerly the Western Australia Tourism Commission and has the specific task of marketing and undertaking promotional activities that will establish the region as a highly desirable tourism destination for intrastate, interstate and international visitors.

Their mission is to increase visitor numbers to the region, extend the average length of stay and encourage visitor spending.

It is the intention of the organisation to provide regional stakeholders with a clear understanding of the promotional direction and key marketing activities of "Australia's Golden Outback" that they can work cooperatively with when considering marketing opportunities for their own tourism businesses.

The organisation will also work closely with the industry by taking a positive, proactive and integrated approach to developing defined marketing strategies, that will create a broader understanding of the importance of collaboration across the four tourism precincts within the region thereby encouraging tourism development and growing visitor numbers.

The objectives of the organisation are to:

- Establish the Australia's Golden Outback region as a recognised and highly desirable visitor destination,
- Increase visitor numbers, length of stay and visitor spending in the region,
- Manage stakeholder contributions to achieve the maximum and most efficient marketing outcomes for the Australia's Golden Outback region,
- Work with all industry partners and stakeholders to ensure that all issues of infrastructure and development, tourism related communication and business opportunities of the region are best achieved.

Tourism Australia was established by the *Tourism Australia Act 2004* (Cth) (TA Act) and as an Australian Government statutory authority is subject to the *Commonwealth Authorities and Companies Act 1997* (Cth) (CAC Act). It is responsible for promoting Australia as a tourism destination internationally and domestically inspiring the world to travel to and throughout Australia as well as delivering research and forecasts for the sector.

The Federal Government funds Tourism Australia to deliver increased economic benefit to Australia from tourism, delivered through a sustainable tourism industry. Under the Tourism Australia Act (2004) their functions are to:

- Influence people to travel to Australia, including for events;
- Influence people travelling to Australia to also travel throughout Australia;
- Influence Australians to travel throughout Australia, including for events;
- Help foster a sustainable tourism industry in Australia; and
- Help increase the economic benefits to Australia from tourism.

Tourism Australia works closely with the tourism industry and Australian State and Territory Government agencies both in Australia and overseas, to achieve goals and objectives for the benefit of all Australians.

The Hon Martin Ferguson AM MP, Federal Minister for Tourism, *Department of Resources, Energy and Tourism* released The National Long-Term Tourism Strategy (NLTTS) on 15 December 2009 to balance the supply and demand policy aspects of the tourism industry.

The NLTTS outlines the long-term policy framework to position the Australian tourism industry as a sustainable and economically vibrant industry. Its recommendations are currently being implemented by a series of working groups who report through the Australian Standing Committee on Tourism (ASCOT) and subsequently to the Tourism Ministers' Council (TMC).

In its first phase, the strategy has been pivotal in consulting with stakeholders and gathering a strong evidence base to support key reforms. The tourism industry contributes nearly AUD34 billion to Australia's GDP, employs over 500,000 people and earns nearly 10 per cent of our total export earnings. The strategy is starting to deliver tangible benefits to industry through:

a refined policy framework to address barriers to industry growth

- an enhanced operating environment conducive for industry growth
- provision of practical assistance to individual businesses

The next phase of the strategy—Tourism 2020—was released on 6 December 2011. It focuses on the practical delivery of more actions that generate real tangible outcomes for tourism businesses. Tourism 2020 will emphasise a closer integration of the National Long-Term Tourism Strategy and Tourism Australia's 2020 Tourism Industry Potential to provide a stronger framework and vision to drive industry ambition, growth and development.

Future Tourism Potential

Project Development

The Projects below have been identified through workshops held with key community stakeholders in November 2013 and February 2014. As part of the workshops, stakeholders were asked to identify key tourism projects for the Shire of Leonora which would increase the length of stay of tourists to the Shire, thus increasing the economic benefit to the community.

The suggested timeframes were:

- Short-term up to 12 months,
- Medium-term between 12 months and 2 years,
- Long-term between 2 years and 5 years.

The GEDC, in conjunction with Regional Development Australia Goldfields-Esperance and the Goldfields Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (GVROC), has developed a comprehensive document that identifies major projects in the region over the next 10 years.

The **Goldfields Esperance Strategic Development Plan 2011-2021** has been developed in consultation with a diverse range of regional stakeholders. Developed in 2011 and reviewed in 2012, it is an organic document which is intended be updated regularly. Of particular interest to the Shire of Leonora is the following project:

The Regional Tourism Strategy is currently in draft and will be finalised in 2014.

The GEDC is also in the process of seeking support from the Shires of the greater Goldfields to develop an Arts and Culture Trail. Initial concept plans have been submitted and approved by the Board of the GEDC, with the GEDC now progressing the plans further.

Tourism WA

In March, 2010, Tourism WA published 'Australia's Golden Outback, Tourism Development Priorities 2010 – 2015'. Included in the priorities for the Shire are the following:

Forward Action Plans

The Shire has developed the Tourism Strategy to determine the types of projects which could enhance the visitor experience in the Shire, as well as increase the economic benefit to the Shire from tourists and tourism. To further develop tourism in the Shire, a Strategic Plan should be developed which will include:

- Goals for each of the key tourism categories, such as Geo-tourism, Events and Eco-tourism,
- Desired outcomes,
- Actions,
- Measurements of Success,
- Key Agencies,
- Timeframes,
- Estimated Budget.

This will enable a broader prospective of the potential achievements for the Shire as well as considering projects which can be included in the Shire budget and projects which have the possibility of being funded by State or Federal funding.

A Project Timeline could be developed for each of the projects to determine the inclusions above.

Risk Analysis

Risk analysis is the identification of both internal and external threats and vulnerabilities to a project or situation. It can also include the Risk Appetite (the level of risk that a corporation is willing to take in order to execute a strategy) and the likelihood of the occurrence.

During workshops held in the Shire, participants were asked to:

- Identify risks to tourism to the Shire of Leonora (considering both internal and external elements),
- Advise the risk appetite of the Shire and Community for the identified risks,
- Advise the likelihood of the risk occurring.

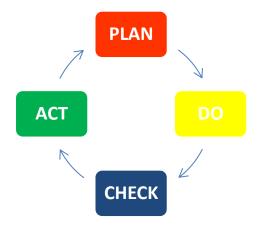
Evaluation for Continual Improvement

Continual improvement is the ongoing process to improve products and services (specific to the tourism industry) and is a framework for continuous improvement. Among the most widely used tools for continuous improvement is a four-step quality model—the plan-do-check-act (PDCA) cycle, also known as Deming Cycle or Shewhart Cycle:

- Plan: Identify an opportunity and plan for change,
- Do: Implement the change on a small scale,
- Check: Use data to analyse the results of the change and determine whether it made a
 difference,
- Act: If the change was successful, implement it on a wider scale and continuously assess your results. If the change did not work, begin the cycle again.

The PDCA model allows the organisation to:

- continually assess the environment of the product or service in order to seek ways to improve to enhance the visitor experience,
- implement the change incorporating internal and external factors,
- analyse results from the community and visitors through surveys,
- further assess the changes required to further improve the results.



PDA Cycle (Deming Cycle or Shewhart Cycle)

The PDCA cycle can be used on current tourist attractions in the Shire through assessing the attraction, identifying the areas which require improvement, implementing the change, analysing the results and further assessing and modifying as required. This will enable the Shire to assess the current status of attractions to ensure that visitors and tourists are receiving the best possible visitor or tourist experience.

Areas of improvement can be assessed or identified through visitor and community surveys at the Visitor Information Centre, a link on the Shires' website, or hyperlinks in the Shire's online newsletter. Once the improvement has been completed, analysis of the results can be obtained by again surveying visitors and community. Further modification if required can then be completed.

It is recommended that the implementation of the change be managed through a Continual Improvement Dashboard Page, which can be developed and updated on an ongoing basis (ie. quarterly review) to ensure that the experience provided to visitors in the Shire is continually assessed and improved. The following Dashboard Page is one example.

- Category or Project identification of the project which requires the change,
- Status where in the Project lifecycle,
- Metric Definition who is providing the quantitate assessment,
- Department who has ownership of the project,
- Key Measurement how you are quantitatively assessing the criteria,
- Target number associated with the key measurement,
- Actual Value Current Quarter input of current quarter statistics,
- Actual Value Previous Quarter input of previous quarter statistics,
- Action identification of the action required to meet the target,
- Start/End Date provide a period for completion of the action,
- Budget monetary value for completion of the action,
- Follow Up Date date to assess the outcome of the action,
- Comments specifics of the tasks you will be completing.

Recommendations

The Shire 'Strategic Community Plan 1 July 2012 to 30 June 2022' (Plan) has been developed to provide a strategic direction for the delivery of services until 2022. The themes evolved from the community engagement process in the development of the Plan include:

- 1. An empowered and spirited community: A community that leverages the skills, knowledge and facilities of the Shire to build a strong sense of community (social themes).
- 2. Economic hub of the Northern Goldfields: A diverse, local economy that encompasses mining support, transport services, medical services and vocational training services (economic themes).
- 3. Forward thinking environmental management: manage the impact of our activity on the environment in a practical and sustainable manner (environmental themes).
- 4. Innovative and proactive Shire and Councillors: Equip our staff and councillors with the skills to lead the Shire into the future (civic leadership themes).

Each of the themes are addressed in the Plan and identify goals, strategies, success indicator, timeframe and actions. The most likely themes to address tourism related goals are the social and economic themes, however no goals or strategies for tourism are included. Minor reviews of the document are conducted every two years and it is recommended that strategies for tourism be included in the next review.

Recommendation 1: include goals and strategies for tourism into the Plan based on the projects listed in Project Development (short/medium/long term projects).

To further enhance the tourism offering in the Shire, consideration should be given to the short term/ low cost Projects which have been identified. These can be easily scoped and costed, and would provide a relative immediate return through extended stay of visitors to the Shire.

Recommendation 2: scope and cost short term Projects.

This will provide the Shire with an indicative costing of the Projects identified.

Recommendation 3: ongoing review of the Strategy.

As the Tourism Strategy is an organic document, it is recommended to review and update the Strategy every two years to maintain its currency.

A tender was also received after the closing time from PE & SM Ferguson in the mail on the morning of 18th July 2014, which was rejected.

At the time of assessing tenders with a view to develop a recommendation for Council to consider, correspondence was received from the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) advising that the Department of Local Government and Communities (DLGC) had provided written advice that practice of inviting tenders for panel contracts is not consistent with the intention of the *Local Government (Functions and General)* Regulations 1996. The DLGC have further advised that this position is supported by advice from the State Solicitor.

Some discussions have been taken with other groups such as Local Government Managers Australia (LGMAWA) as to whether this position from the DLGC had been discussed with industry groups, and to ascertain whether the position of the DLGC is maintained by others. LGMAWA confirmed that the matter has been discussed by their Legislative Review Committee, and the view was put forward to the DLGC that panel tenders should be available to local governments. There are many local governments that currently use panel contracts, and perhaps some larger metropolitan local governments that will continue to do so, supported by their own legal advice. In the meantime however, awarding a panel contract as per Tender 02/2014 could see the DLGC take action against the Shire of Leonora.

As a result of this recent advice that panel contracts are not permissible, it is recommended that none of the tenders submitted be accepted. Staff are currently working on developing new tender documents that are more specific in awarding contracts to carry out restoration of road assets (as per approved funding and project descriptions) so that tenders can be called, awarded and works can commence.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 11 states that tenders are to be publicly invited before a Local Government enters into a Contract for another person to supply goods or services if the consideration under the Contract is expected to be worth more than \$100,000.00.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no Policy implications resulting from the recommendation of this report.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

An amount of \$1,880,000 is contained within the current budget for projects that include these works. This will be partly funded by approved funds for declared weather event and associated damage (roadworks and reinstatements).

STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS

There are no strategic implications resulting from the recommendation of this report.

A tender was also received after the closing time from PE & SM Ferguson in the mail on the morning of 18th July 2014, which was rejected.

It was previously advised to Councillors that correspondence was received from the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) advising that the Department of Local Government and Communities (DLGC) had provided written advice that the practice of inviting tenders for panel contracts is not consistent with the intention of the *Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 1996* and it was advised that panel contracts should not be considered given this advice. The DLGC have further advised that this position is supported by advice from the State Solicitor.

Some discussions have been undertaken with other groups such as Local Government Managers Australia (LGMA WA) as to whether this position from the DLGC had been discussed with industry groups, and to ascertain whether the position of the DLGC is maintained by others. LGMA WA confirmed that the matter has been discussed by their Legislative Review Committee, and the view was put forward to the DLGC that panel tenders should be available to local governments. There are many local governments that currently use panel contracts, and perhaps some larger metropolitan local governments that will continue to do so, supported by their own legal advice. Initially, from advice collected, it was formulated that awarding a panel contract as per Tender 02/2014 could see the DLGC take action against the Shire of Leonora. At the time, based on this advice that panel contracts are not permissible, it was recommended that none of the tenders submitted be accepted.

Fortunately, since that advice, advocacy on behalf of local governments has paid off. The DLGC has amended its position somewhat, advising that action will not be taken against local governments that award panel contracts until such time as legislation is amended to clarify the DLGC's interpretation of the regulations. Although this will allow the aforementioned works to be carried out using a panel contract, Council may consider forming a position on the issue to put forward to the DLGC. It is the interpretation of many that panel contracts should be allowed, and the reality is that panel contracts offer an effective means of carrying out a variety of works to achieve results in a cost effective, efficient and timely manner.

Tenders submitted have been assessed using criteria stated in tender documents, and a recommendation is included below for Council consideration to award primary and secondary tenders for the following:

Grader 140H or similar
Dozer D7 or similar

'Other Plant' items submitted were considered not essential to project works and therefore have also been excluded from the recommendation.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 11 states that tenders are to be publicly invited before a Local Government enters into a Contract for another person to supply goods or services if the consideration under the Contract is expected to be worth more than \$100,000.00.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

An amount of \$1,880,000 is contained within the current budget for projects that include these works. This will be partly funded by approved funds for declared weather event and associated damage (roadworks and reinstatements).

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this statement of financial activity are:

(a) Basis of Accounting

This statement is a special purpose financial report, prepared in accordance with applicable Australian Australian Accounting Standards, other mandatory professional reporting requirements and the Local Government Act 1995 (as amended) and accompanying regulations (as amended).

(b) The Local Government Reporting Entity

All Funds through which the Council controls resources to carry on its functions have been included in this statement.

In the process of reporting on the local government as a single unit, all transactions and balances between those funds (for example, loans and transfers between Funds) have been eliminated.

All monies held in the Trust Fund are excluded from the statement, but a separate statement of those monies appears at Note 12.

(c) Rounding Off Figures

All figures shown in this statement are rounded to the nearest dollar.

(d) Rates, Grants, Donations and Other Contributions

Rates, grants, donations and other contributions are recognised as revenues when the local government obtains control over the assets comprising the contributions. Control over assets acquired from rates is obtained at the commencement of the rating period or, where earlier, upon receipt of the rates.

(e) Goods and Services Tax

In accordance with recommended practice, revenues, expenses and assets capitalised are stated net of any GST recoverable. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of applicable GST.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are included as short-term borrowings in current liabilities.

(g) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables, which generally have 30 - 90 day terms, are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less any allowance for uncollectible amounts.

Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts that are known to be uncollectible are written off when identified. An allowance for doubtful debts is raised when there is objective evidence that they will not be collectible.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(h) Inventories

General

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated **Closing Funding Surplus(Deficit)**

Inventories held from trading are classified as current even if not expected to be realised in the next 12 months.

Land Held for Resale

Land purchased for development and/or resale is valued at the lower of the cost and net realisable value. Cost includes the cost of acquisition, development and interest incurred on the financing of that land during its development. Interest and holding charges incurred after development is complete are recognised as expenses.

Revenue arising from the sale of property is recognised in the operating statement as at the time of signing a binding contract of sale.

Land held for resale is classified as current except where it is held as non-current based on Council's intentions to release for sale.

(i) Fixed Assets

All assets are initially recognised at cost. Cost is determined as the fair value of the assets given as consideration plus costs incidental to the acquisition. For assets acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration, cost is determined as fair value at the date of acquisition. The cost of non-current assets constructed by the local government includes the cost of all materials used in the construction, direct labour on the project and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead.

Certain asset classes may be revalued on a regular basis such that the carrying values are not materially different from fair value. Assets carried at fair value are to be revalued with sufficient regularity to ensure the carrying amount does not differ materially from that determined using fair value at reporting date.

(j) Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

All non-current assets having a limited useful life are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner which reflects the consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in those assets.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis, using rates which are reviewed each reporting period. Major depreciation rates and periods are:

Buildings	30 to 50 years

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(k) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables are carried at amortised cost. They represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the local government prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Shire becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(l) Employee Benefits

The provisions for employee benefits relates to amounts expected to be paid for long service leave, annual leave, wages and salaries and are calculated as follows:

(i) Wages, Salaries, Annual Leave and Long Service Leave (Short-term Benefits) The provision for employees' benefits to wages, salaries, annual leave and long service leave expected to

be settled within 12 months represents the amount the Shire has a present obligation to pay resulting from employees services provided to balance date. The provision has been calculated at nominal amounts based on remuneration rates the Shire expects to pay and includes related on-costs.

(ii) Annual Leave and Long Service Leave (Long-term Benefits)

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits and measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the project unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows. Where the Shire does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months, the liability is recognised as a current liability.

(m) Interest-bearing Loans and Borrowings

All loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs.

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fees paid on the establishment of loan facilities that are yield related are included as part of the carrying amount of the loans and borrowings.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Council has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the balance sheet date.

Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs are recognised as an expense when incurred except where they are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset. Where this is the case, they are capitalised as part of the cost of the particular asset.

(n) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when: The council has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events; it is more likely than not that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and the amount has been reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one of item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(o) Current and Non-Current Classification

In the determination of whether an asset or liability is current or non-current, consideration is given to the time when each asset or liability is expected to be settled. The asset or liability is classified as current if it is expected to be settled within the next 12 months, being the Council's operational cycle. In the case of liabilities where Council does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months, such as vested long service leave, the liability is classified as current even if not expected to be settled within the next 12 months. Inventories held for trading are classified as current even if not expected to be realised in the next 12 months except for land held for resale where it is held as non current based on Council's intentions to release for sale.

(p) Nature or Type Classifications

Rates

All rates levied under the Local Government Act 1995. Includes general, differential, specific area rates, minimum rates, interim rates, back rates, ex-gratia rates, less discounts offered. Exclude administration fees, interest on instalments, interest on arrears, service charges and sewerage rates.

Operating Grants, Subsidies and Contributions

Refer to all amounts received as grants, subsidies and contributions that are not non-operating grants.

Non-Operating Grants, Subsidies and Contributions

Amounts received specifically for the acquisition, construction of new or the upgrading of non-current assets paid to a local government, irrespective of whether these amounts are received as capital grants, subsidies, contributions or donations.

Profit on Asset Disposal

Profit on the disposal of assets including gains on the disposal of long term investments. Losses are disclosed under the expenditure classifications.

Fees and Charges

Revenues (other than service charges) from the use of facilities and charges made for local government services, sewerage rates, rentals, hire charges, fee for service, photocopying charges, licences, sale of goods or information, fines, penalties and administration fees. Local governments may wish to disclose more detail such as rubbish collection fees, rental of property, fines and penalties, other fees and charges.

Service Charges

Service charges imposed under Division 6 of Part 6 of the Local Government Act 1995. Regulation 54 of the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 identifies the These are television and radio broadcasting, underground electricity and neighbourhood surveillance services. Exclude rubbish removal charges. Interest and other items of a similar nature received from bank and investment accounts, interest on rate instalments, interest on rate arrears and interest on debtors.

Interest Earnings

Interest and other items of a similar nature received from bank and investment accounts, interest on rate instalments, interest on rate arrears and interest on debtors.

Other Revenue / Income

Other revenue, which can not be classified under the above headings, includes dividends, discounts, rebates etc.

Employee Costs

All costs associate with the employment of person such as salaries, wages, allowances, benefits such as vehicle and housing, superannuation, employment expenses, removal expenses, relocation expenses, worker's compensation insurance, training costs, conferences, safety expenses, medical examinations, fringe benefit tax, etc.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(q) Nature or Type Classifications (Continued)

Materials and Contracts

All expenditures on materials, supplies and contracts not classified under other headings. These include supply of goods and materials, legal expenses, consultancy, maintenance agreements, communication expenses, advertising expenses, membership, periodicals, publications, hire expenses, rental, leases, postage and freight etc. Local governments may wish to disclose more detail such as contract services, consultancy, information technology, rental or lease expenditures.

Utilities (Gas, Electricity, Water, etc.)

Expenditures made to the respective agencies for the provision of power, gas or water. Exclude expenditures incurred for the reinstatement of roadwork on behalf of these agencies.

Insurance

All insurance other than worker's compensation and health benefit insurance included as a cost of employment.

Loss on asset disposal

Loss on the disposal of fixed assets.

Depreciation on non-current assets

Depreciation expense raised on all classes of assets.

Interest expenses

Interest and other costs of finance paid, including costs of finance for loan debentures, overdraft accommodation and refinancing expenses.

Other expenditure

Statutory fees, taxes, provision for bad debts, member's fees or levies including WA Fire Brigade Levy and State taxes. Donations and subsidies made to community groups.

(r) Statement of Objectives

In order to discharge its responsibilities to the community, the Council has developed a set of operational and financial objectives. These objectives have been established both on an overall basis and for each of its broad activities/programs.

Council operations as disclosed in this statement encompass the following service orientated activities/programs:

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

GOVERNANCE

Includes costs and revenues associated with the President and Councillors in the exercise of their obligations as a governing body. Items of expenditure include conference, travel, meeting attendance fees, presidential allowance, receptions, donations, subscriptions and phone rentals. Costs of advertising and conducting elections are also included. Revenues include election nomination fees and reimbursements by members for private expenses.

An administration cost is also allocated which enables staff to process Council Meeting procedures, implement all government decisions and conduct Council meetings. Cost of conducting audit of Council books of accounts and procedures is also include under this heading.

GENERAL PURPOSE FUNDING

1 Rates

- (a) GRV (gross rental value) refers to property rates for Leonora, Gwalia, Leinster and Agnew town sites and operational mines and associated infrastructure.
- (b) UV (unimproved value) refers to mining properties and tenements (other than mines and other associated infrastructure) and includes prospecting licences, exploration licences and mining leases. It also refers to broad acre rural pastoral properties.
- (c) Additional rates and rates written back refer mainly to mining rates where tenements are granted or surrendered following the adoption of the budget.
- (d) Administration charge refers to the charge levied on ratepayers electing to make payment of rates on the offered instalment plan and is based on the actual cost involved in administering this process
- (e) Administration costs allocated are the costs of maintaining records, levying and collecting all rates.

2 Grants

- (a) Grants Commission a general purpose grant allocated annually by the Federal Government to all local governments. The amount is determined by various formulae devised by the Grants Commission, with a significant component being based on population.
- (b) Roads Grant An untied road grant allocated by the Federal Government and again distributed by the Grants Commission utilising a pre-determined formula.
- (c) Administration costs allocated to grants refers to the costs associated in collection of Federal Government grants including provision and updating of data used in grants commission formula.

3 Interest from Investments

Includes interest received on surplus funds invested throughout the year from both operating and reserve accounts.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(r) STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVE (Continued)

LAW, ORDER, PUBLIC SAFETY

Costs and revenues associated with animal control within the Shire and also includes fire insurance, dog control and registration.

HEALTH

Costs and revenues associated with compliance with the Health Act including inspections and approvals, food quality control, mosquito control, septic tank inspection/control, food hygiene inspection/control, contribution to doctors expenses, Royal Flying Doctor donation and notification of disease.

EDUCATION AND WELFARE

Provision of support for education and aged and disabled facilities within the district for the betterment of the residents.

HOUSING

Costs of maintaining Council owned accommodation units and collection of rentals paid by staff for use of those buildings. Costs that can be accurately attributed to other programs are allocated. Revenue associated with a State Government owned house by way of loan repayments to Council are also included.

Accommodation units include 3 houses, 2 duplexes and a single persons quarters.

COMMUNITY AMENITIES

Costs of collection and disposal of domestic and commercial refuse for town site of Leonora and Gwalia and maintenance of the landfill refuse site. Revenue collection by way of an annual fee for this service which is included on rate assessment notices.

Costs associated with review and administration of Council's Town Planning Scheme.

Provision of Christmas decorations in Leonora Town site.

Operation of the Leonora Cemetery.

RECREATION AND CULTURE

Provision and maintenance of Council owned parks, gardens and grassed oval/recreation ground at Leonora and a contribution to similar facilities within Leinster town site.

Costs of operation and maintenance of a purpose built recreation centre which includes indoor basketball court, two squash courts, kitchen, gymnasium and associated facilities and revenues collected from the public for use of these facilities.

Costs of maintenance of Council owned and provided television and radio re-transmission service which includes GWN, WIN and SBS television and WAFM and ABC fine music radio.

Costs and revenues associated with the operation and maintenance of library facilities at Leonora in conjunction with the Library Board of Western Australia.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(r) STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVE (Continued)

TRANSPORT

Maintenance and improvements of 1,300 kilometres of Council controlled unsealed roads, town site footpaths and streets, drainage control, street cleaning and provision and maintenance of street trees. Costs of providing electricity for steel lights in the Leonora/Gwalia town sites and maintenance of Council's works depot and associated infrastructure.

Operation, maintenance and management of Leonora Aerodrome including runways, runway lighting, tarmac and terminal building and gardens. Purchase of aviation fuel for resale to aircraft operators.

Revenues by way of landing fees and Head Tax charges charged to all aircraft with the exception of the Royal Flying Doctors Service, lease/renting of building to all users of facilities and charges for fuel supplied to aircraft.

ECONOMIC SERVICES

Costs associated with tourism promotion throughout the Shire including employment of a Curator/Promotion Officer at the Gwalia Museum and historic precinct.

Contribution to employment of a Goldfields/Esperance Development Officer operating from Shire Offices - Leonora.

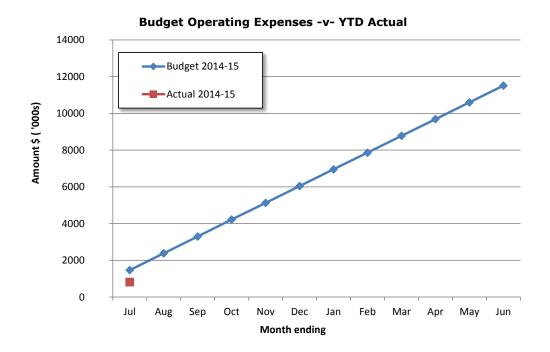
Costs and revenues associated with building control under building regulations, including inspections and issuing building permits.

Costs and revenues for private hire of Council machinery and operators for completion of private works for ratepayers and others.

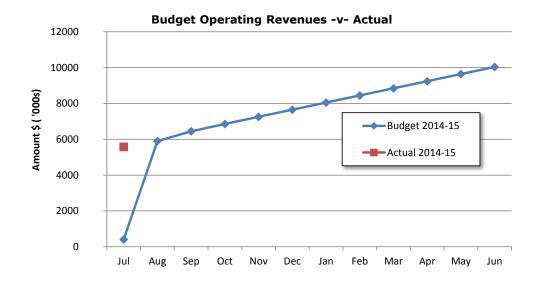

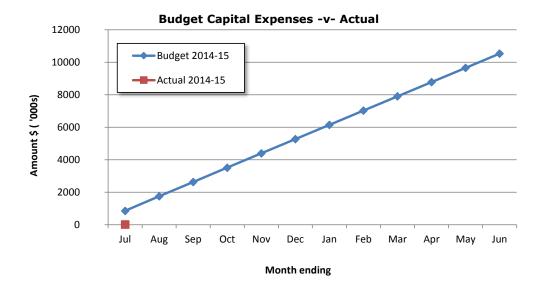

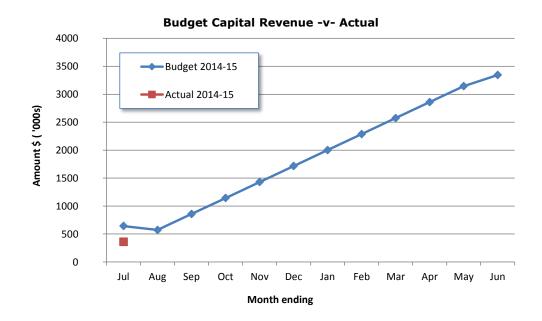
